— powerful, luxury, big, comfortable," Kulwik said. "The ride and drive of the Cougar is just far superior to a Mustang of that age."

Both products of Ford, the Mustang and Cougar share many interchangeable parts, but the Cougar is 7 inches longer, Kulwik said.

Because of the longer wheelbase

and the heavier vehicle, the ride is very different" in a Cougar, he said. He called it "just a pleasure to drive."

Mike Keast of Ionia, Michigan, came to the show with his 1969 Cougar XR7 convertible.

"I bought my Cougar as a retirement gift to myself," Keast said. "It's the car that I always wanted but never had.'
